

The 8th Session of the 25th House of Representatives,
3rd Year (Second Annual Ordinary Session)



On 24th November 2021, at the House of Representatives Chamber, 2nd floor, Parliament Building, H.E. Mr. Chuan Leekpai, Speaker of the House of Representatives, chaired the 8th Session of the 25th House of Representatives, 3rd Year (Second Annual Ordinary Session) with Hon. Mr. Suchart Tanchaen, First Deputy Speaker of the House of Representatives, and Hon. Mr. Supachai Phosu, Second Deputy Speaker of the House of Representatives, served as the Chair of the sitting in rotation. The urgent matters to be considered are as follows:

(1) Cosmetic Product Bill (No. ..), B.E. (proposed by the Cabinet)

Hon. Mr. Satit Pitutacha, Deputy Minister of Public Health, stated the principles and rationales of the Bill for the sitting consideration aimed to facilitate the licensing of cosmetic products to be convenient, rapid and efficient and the public general could access more safety

and higher quality products. It also shall encourage small-scale operators such as, the SMEs firms could be able to operate their businesses and develop their cosmetic products.

The sitting resolved to approve the first reading and agreed in principles of the Cosmetic Product Bill, (No. ..), B.E. with 319 votes and also agreed to establish the Ad-hoc Committee which are composed of 25 members for further considerations and the time limit for the amendments to motions was set for 7 days.

(2) Food Bill (No. ..), B.E. (proposed by the Cabinet)

Hon. Mr. Sathit Pituteja, Deputy Minister of Public Health, stated the principles and rationales of the Bill which aims to regulate the measures of food control according to the technology transformation in food production and food advertisement at present. It would be made for people's safety consumption which complied with the good quality and internal standard of food products. In addition, it also improved competitiveness of food products export to be varied to the changes of current international trades, as well as provided procedures for more rapid and effective licensing. Moreover, the Bill had not been amended for more than 40 years.

The sitting resolved to approve the first reading and agreed in principles of the Food Bill, (No. ..), B.E. with 312 votes and also agreed to establish the Ad-hoc Committee which are composed of 25 members for further considerations and the time limit for the amendment to motions was set for 7 days.

(3) Public Limited Companies Bill (No. ..), B.E. (proposed by the Cabinet)

Hon. Mr. Sinit Lertkrai, Deputy Minister of the Ministry of Commerce, stated the principles and rationales of the Bill that the Bill had not been enforced for a long time, would be not conform to technology transformation and development. Thus, the Bill should be revised and modernized itself according to the current situation. It shall allow the Public Limited Companies utilize the electronic methods in the meetings of Board of Directors and stakeholders, e-books or documents, including sending the letter of attorney for the meeting thereof for reducing the redundancy of business processes of the companies and the people, vis-a-vis, increasing the capacity of national competitiveness.

The sitting resolved to approve the first reading and agreed in principles of the Public Limited Companies Bill, (No. ..), B.E. with 291 votes, and also agreed to establish the Ad-hoc Committee which are composed of 25 members for further considerations and the time limit for amendment to motions was set for 7 days.
